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

Leading Change

Autism Nova Scotia has always been at the forefront of advocacy and action, both provincially and nationally. This year was no different. Thanks to the tireless work of our board of directors, staff, volunteers, and community partners, we continued our work of expanding the many ways in which autistic people are included and actively engaged in the communities they live, work and play in.

We have made great strides this year. A \$1.4 million investment by the Province of Nova Scotia in job supports will be administered through Autism Nova Scotia. This investment will remove previous support barriers and ensure jobseekers on the Autism Spectrum have access to the support they need to reach their full potential in the workplace. We recognize that life is not all about work and that important skills can be developed in fun,

less structured settings. Last fall, our Dungeons & Dragons program made national headlines by providing individuals on the spectrum the chance to develop new social skills in a collaborative, role-playing environment.

In 2017, Autism Nova Scotia was also awarded an annual grant from the Department of Health and Wellness to improve the capacity of our communities to deliver support across the province. With this funding, we have leveraged our existing chapter network to establish 8 Regional Autism Centres, where Autism Support Coordinators can build partnerships, host programs and offer enhanced support for autistics and their families across the province.

As a national leader in autism supports and advocacy, our work is never done. There are many challenges and service gaps that continue to affect the lives of of the community we serve. This past year we actively to the report of Nova Scotia's Inclusion Commission, released in March 2018, which presented a new blueprint for delivering education to students on the Autism Spectrum and improving their classroom experience. While there remains much work to be done the report's recognition of the need for appropriate, person-centred, needs-based supports will ensure all students have access to an inclusive, high quality public education.

Why We Advocate

Autism Nova Scotia collaborates with the autism community to identify the most prevalent issues and priorities facing individuals and families living on the Autism Spectrum and works with identified stakeholders and partners to achieve meaningful, systematic change. Systemic change is not easy, nor does it always come as timely as we would like, but it is critical to ensure an integrated continuum of programs and service delivery across our province.

In 2017, the number of complex cases Autism Nova Scotia was asked to assist with increased by 100%. Some of these cases were followed in the media, while others were not, but represented equally challenging. Their struggle illustrates the need for robust family services, short term crisis interventions, and housing supports for autistic individuals across the lifespan.

Developing and implementing solutions in conjunction with government and community partners continues to be a priority. Each of the 14,000 individuals on the Autism Spectrum and their families in Nova Scotia have a unique set of needs that requires an individualized approach.

We draw strength from the experiences and stories of self-advocates, parents, family members, and professionals who are courageous in confronting and challenging the status quo.

Their struggles, are our struggles.



Education

Supports for Success

Every individual on the Autism Spectrum is entitled to education that is responsive to their diverse learning needs. Autism Nova Scotia is committed to advocating for policies and structural changes to our education system that will ensure future generations of the autism community are provided with an inclusive and comprehensive education that will foster their full learning potential as they transition to community, post-secondary and/or employment.

The Commission on Inclusive Education released their report, Students First: Inclusive Education that Supports Teaching, Learning, and the Success of all Nova Scotia Students, on March 26, 2018. After receiving feedback from over 5000 Nova Scotians, the commission suggested the setting aside of approximately \$15 million, in the first year of a 5-year plan, to support the 36% of students that have a special need in Nova Scotia's public education system.

Supports and services for the autism community feature prominently in the report. Of those students identified as needing additional resources and learning supports, at least 13% are on the Autism Spectrum. Government has invested in

switching the current system from a programdriven model to a student needs-based model. This includes recognition that additional professional services are required to accommodate the specific needs of individuals on the Autism Spectrum.

The report names Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) as an exceptionality, and that's a first for Nova Scotia. This recognition reflects the growing prevalence rates of autism and the need to develop policy that addresses the unique needs of the student population.

Autism Nova Scotia will continue to work and collaborate with government to ensure timely and effective implementation of the report as it relates to the autism community.

Employment

Breakthroughs in Policy and Inclusion

Autism Nova Scotia has provided employment supports and services to the autistic community for over 8 years. We offer a comprehensive service system and a scope that spans the Atlantic provinces, and believe it is crucial that appropriate and evidence based skills development programs are delivered throughout the Maritimes.

In 2017, the provincial government announced a \$1.4 million investment in job supports and services. This is an historic investment and shift in policy that will help autistic individuals secure, retain, and remain in the workforce.

Through programs like Worktopia and Ready, Willing and Able, we will continue to provide individualized job training, coaching for employees and employers, hands-on work experience, and much more.

Secure employment is a pillar of economic inclusion, as well as community and inclusive living. Employment has a positive impact on the quality of life for autistic individuals, while creating the conditions needed for the full participation in and contributions to the local and provincial economy.

Redefining Inclusion Provincially

Regional Autism Centres

Autism Nova Scotia recognizes the need for equitable delivery of service throughout the province. We are committed to advocating for an increase in the capacity for supports and services available to Nova Scotians, no matter where they live.

In 2017, the provincial government announced it would provide Autism Nova Scotia with a \$300,000 annual grant to further expand our supports and services across the province. We have opened 8 regional autism centres in the last several months in collaboration with our chapter staff

and volunteers. These regional centres provide a base of operations in the rural regions of the province, allowing for equitable access regardless of location. Autistic individuals, families, and community partners have rallied around these locations and they operate as integral components of our provincial strategy. At each location, regional autism coordinators provide part-time, frontline services to help coordinate everything from family support to programming.


This annual support will ensure equitable access to programs and services where Nova Scotians live, work, and play.



Pictou County Swimming Program

The Autism Swim program has run out of the YMCA Pictou County Wellness Centre since 2014, providing one-on-one swimming instruction to individuals with ASD. According to recent studies, 91% of accidental deaths for children with autism involve drowning. The program focuses on developing essential swimming and water safety skills in a sensory-friendly, instructive setting.

The swim is limited to 8 participants at a time in the pool, with 56 total participants in each session. Each participant is assigned an instructor whose sole focus is on skill development for that

individual. The instructors are all trained in autismspecific education best practices and can offer visuals or other learning techniques as needed. The result is a comprehensive swimming instruction program where participants develop strong relationships and strive to do their best in a fun, inclusive environment.

The program was conceived and implemented entirely by Autism Nova Scotia: Pictou County staff and volunteers. These trailblazers are a source of inspiration and demonstrate the possibilities that exist when a community rallies around a program or cause.

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
Best of Local November 3, 2017
