Benefitting from her leadership, Autism Nova Scotia has grown from three employees in 2008 to a province-wide organization employing more than 100 people throughout 10 regional autism centres. Not only did she lead the organization through the Covid pandemic, Cynthia supported the rural expansion of QuickStart Nova Scotia, strengthened employment and independent living programs and sat on numerous committees in support of the disability community.

In addition to acting as a past chair of the Autism Alliance of Canada, Cynthia was named one of Atlantic Business Magazine's Top 50 CEOs in 2021. Next month, Cynthia will become an Associate Deputy Minister [ADM] with the Department of Community Services.
